Utility Gets Two A's

In preparation for a new issue of long-term debt to pay for the new water plant on the west end of town, the city applied to Standard & Poor's (S&P) for a current bond credit rating. The credit rating is important when bond buyers determine the rate of interest they require to justify their investment in our system (risk versus return). Given the dire financial circumstances witnessed nationally over the past year, credit ratings have taken on an evengreater influence in the investment marketplace. The result of the city's recent effort: "AA-" representing a substantial upgrade! (equivalent to going from a "C+" to an "A-"). Perhaps more important to ratepayers is the effect the higher rating had on the bonds issued to pay for the new water plant; the lower interest rates translated to reduced interest cost of nearly \$200,000 over the life of the bonds (a net present value of more than \$120,000)!

Two notable factors contributed to the dramatic improvement in the utility's bond rating: customer growth and strong financial management. The tremendous growth in the number of utility customers over the past decade has helped create a larger financial base to absorb major projects (like a second water plant).

Sound financial management was the compelling factor, as indicated by the following quote from the S&P rating report.

"The financial performance of Pasco's waterworks utility system has been strong"

These opinions reflect well on the long-term effort by your City Council and staff to keep rates as low as possible while assuring, first and foremost, that the rates are sufficient to cover all debt obligations and operational costs with sufficient "reserves" to absorb unexpected circumstances without increasing rates. This has been the guidance and focus of the utility's management for the past 15 years, leading to appropriate growth, system improvements and modest rates (Pasco's water rate is the lowest of the three cities).



In short, third-party investment advisors (S&P) have graded Pasco as high as any utility in the region, on their "...expectation that the (utility) system will continue to generate net revenues sufficient to maintain good debt service coverage and a strong liquidity position, in line with Pasco's policy." A very good report card - from a very tough grader!

June is Home Safety Month!

The Home Safety Council has designated June as Home Safety Month. Each year, nearly 21 million family members suffer injuries that could have been prevented.

The three most common preventable injuries involve slips and falls, poisoning, and fires and burns. Following are some simple safety tips for every home:

- * Install and maintain smoke alarms on each level of the home.
- * Lower the water heater temperature. Check the setting and make sure it is no higher than 120 degrees F.
- * Make sure all matches and lighters are locked up where children cannot access them.
- * Candles should only be used in non-combustible containers and never should be left burning unattended.
- * Plan and practice fire drills in the home.
- * More than two-thirds of homes with young children report they have chemicals stored in unlocked places. Typical household cleaners, bleach, and other chemicals can cause a serious poisoning. Know the National Poison Control Center number 1 (800) 222-1222. Lock up all poisons around the home.
- * Install a Carbon Monoxide Detector to guard against the silent killer.

Slips and falls are the leading cause of unintentional injury in the home. Bathrooms are especially dangerous. Install grab bars in the tub, shower and near toilets. Use slip-proof mats in the bathtub and shower.

- * Use bright lights at the top and bottom of stairs and make sure hallways are also lit.
- * Stairs and steps should have secured handrails in
- * Homes with toddlers should have gates installed at the top and bottom of stairs.
- * Last but not least, clean up spills promptly!
