

Revitalizing Pasco's downtown area has been a Council priority for a number of years and when outlining its 2010-2011 goals, revitalization became a major priority. Now, a new public development authority (PDA) has been created to lead that effort.

Officially titled the Downtown Pasco Development Authority, its purpose is to develop and implement a multi-year plan for the downtown area. It is patterned after "main street" programs across the country.

#### THE NEW PDA WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR:

- marketing and promoting the downtown area, including special events.
- facilitating and increasing private investment in the downtown area.
- increasing economic vitality of the area.
- eliminating blight and creating jobs.
- participating in the City's Facade Improvement Program.

• entering into agreements with cultural, public, other not-for-profit entities and/or private firms for programs or projects consistent with this purpose.

The PDA will also provide the structure for downtown merchants, property owners and other organizations to become involved in all revitalization efforts.

The public corporation is governed by an appointed board and will have a full-time executive director. Together the board and executive director will create a strategic plan to help identify and prioritize specific needs within the downtown area.

The Pasco Downtown Development Authority will help launch Pasco's downtown area into a thriving focal point of the community.

# Pasco Reports Significant Growth

In the past 10 years, Pasco has grown by 86 percent, according to numbers recently released by the U.S. Census Bureau. During the 2000 census, Pasco's population was 32,066; for 2010, that number jumped to 59,781. The city's 2011 population is expected to exceed 61,000.

The growth can be attributed to continued strength of employment related to the Hanford area, food production and industrial development.

Significant growth has taken place both on the west and east sides of the community.

To meet the challenges posed by the rapid pace of growth, the city has added 21new police officers over the last decade, opened a third fire station, constructed eight new neighborhood parks while also assuming maintenance responsibility for 82 miles of new streets, 92 miles of new water lines and 83 miles of new sewer lines. And, the city's property tax rate has declined by 35% over the same time period.
