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FIELD OPERATIONS Captain Bill Parramore

Captain Bill Parramore heads the Field Operations Division (FOD), which is comprised of highly visible members of our police department. This division operates 24/7, addressing all community service requests.

You will find Patrol Officers, District Resource Officers, and School Resource Officers within the Field Operations Division. Captain Parramore also supervises specialized units, including the Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team, the Canine Unit, the Homeless Liaison Unit, and the Traffic Unit.



FIELD OPERATIONS - DISTRICT POLICING

In 2022, the Pasco Police thoroughly analyzed their existing patrol model and the patrol division's capability to address the community's needs. Following this assessment, the decision was made to transition to a district policing model in early 2024. Under this model, the city was strategically restructured into two districts, each overseen by a lieutenant with a designated sergeant in each district. This is a departure from the previous approach, where one sergeant was responsible for the entire city.

Additionally, the model involved restructuring the existing four zones into six patrol zones, resulting in smaller areas of responsibility for patrol officers. As Pasco Police expands its department by adding more officers over the next five years, the implementation of district policing is expected to enhance the level of community service provided to the citizens of Pasco.

Moving to District Policing has Direct Benefits to our Community:

- Increased community-based problem solving with the addition of strategic task management by lieutenants and sergeants. District Officers are assigned to each shift to ensure task management of problems at the patrol level.
- Increases direct supervision for front-line officers, ensuring access to a sergeant with the experience necessary to undertake problem solving measures during critical incidents.
- Smaller patrol zones allowing for faster response times and more flexibility in moving officers around the city to directly address increasing problems in a certain area.



SUPPORT OPERATIONS Captain Jeff Harpster

Support Operations Division (SOD), led by Captain Jeff Harpster, is comprised of detectives, task force officers, evidence, and records. Detectives investigate all felony-level crimes that occur within the City of Pasco. SOD has twelve detectives, with four of them assigned to Street Crimes Unit (SCU). They are supervised by two Sergeants. Pasco has one evidence technician whose job entails processing crime scenes, tracking and managing all evidence, and submitting evidence to the crime lab. Records is overseen by the records manager, who ensures every police report, arrest, and ticket is approved and accurately imputed into the records management system. Records offer the first point of contact for customer service, responding to public records requests, offering fingerprinting services, approving concealed pistol license applications, and ensuring background checks for all applicants.

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PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS Captain Brian Vaught

The Professional Standards Division (PSD), led by Captain Brian Vaught, maintains the integrity and professionalism of the Pasco Police Department and it's employees, ensuring its standards are maintained through professionalism and accountability.

Professional Standards oversees the hiring of new officers, citizen complaints, use of force, internal investigations, and ensures Pasco's policies align with the requirements for Pasco's dual accreditations from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies Inc. (CALEA) and the Washington State Association of Chiefs and Sheriffs (WASPC).

- In 2023, Pasco passed both the CALEA and WASPC inspections, earning re-accreditation from both agencies.






2023 CRIME DATA Crime Statistics

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Pasco Police Department saw a notable reduction in crime across all categories in 2023, compared to 2022. In 2023, the rate of crime in Pasco was roughly 54 per 1,000 population, down from 64 per 1,000 in 2022. Overall, crimes against property had the largest reduction in incidents compared to 2022, a reduction of 22%. This is significant because property crime represents 42% of all crime in Pasco. Violent crime decreased 5% from 2022-2023, with a notable 13% reduction in shootings from 2022-2023.

2023 Crime Data at a Glance


- Arrests down 7.7% from 2022
- Citations up 3.6% from 2022
- Traffic collisions down 16.0% from 2022



Part I crimes include the categories of homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, auto theft, and arson
Part I crimes are down 20% from 2022-2023. A large part of this reduction is due to rates of auto theft decreasing 40% from 2022-2023. The only category that did not show a reduction in incidents was robbery,

representing no change from 2022-2023.

Part II crimes include the categories of simple assault, forgery, fraud, stolen property, malicious mischief, weapons offenses, sex offenses, narcotics offenses, DUI, trespass, and kidnapping.
Part II crimes are down 5.3% from 2022-2023.
Stolen property offenses saw one of the greatest decreases in incidents from 2022 to 2023 of 44%. This category includes the charge of possession of a stolen vehicle.





TRAFFIC DATA:

The numbers of traffic stops increased 2.7% from 3,655 traffic stops in 2022 to 3,752 in 2023.

In 2023, officers issued 2,563 traffic tickets. Reportable collisions remain about the same for the past two years.

CALLS FOR SERVICE

In 2023, Pasco Police Officers responded to 55,145 calls for service. Calls for service in 2023 are down 5% compared to 2022.



RECOGNIZING EXCELLENCE



Regional Academy - Excellence in Instruction



In 2023, Pasco Police Department spearheaded the launch of a regional police academy that opened in May of 2023, led by PPD Sergeant Ward. By November of 2023, certificates of excellence were presented to (from left to right): BCSO Lt. Magnuson, PPD Sergeant Ward, KPD Officer Sullivan, and PPD Officer Vargas for delivering the curriculum that will help to keep police recruits local and provide them with the highest quality of training. The academy has trained 28 recruits since its opening and is set to graduate 28 more in February of 2024.

He has contributed significantly to the development and enhancement of firearms training programs, both instructing and leading these efforts. Notably, Officer Wright has trained six officers and spent 727 hours on training in the past year alone. His commitment, positivity, and dedication made him an outstanding candidate for Employee of the Year.
